# CHRISTMAS TREES

As usual the town will be decorated with Christmas trees and lights throughout December. The trees and lights will be erected by Ecclian Society members and friends on Sunday 1st December. The 25 foot tree in the Holy Trinity churchyard and the 20 foot tree at the crossroads are erected by Woods Farm.

**The Parish Council wishes to** thank the Ecclian Society who will erect the 72 small Christmas Trees in the town and check the brackets, Woods Christmas Tree Farm at Solihull for supplying and delivering all the trees, A.S. Electrical Services for installing the lights on the large trees and Traction Equipment for the cherry pickers.

The decorations on the crossroads tree were made once again by the children at the Bishop Lonsdale Academy.

### The trees are funded by the Eccleshall Parish Council.

### **CROSS ROAD CAROLS**

The lights on the large tree at the crossroads, adorned with baubles decorated by the children from Bishop Lonsdale School, will be switched on to the accompaniment of carol singers at 5pm on Sunday 1st December.

# **Eccleshall Library**

Eccleshall Parish Council took over the running of the Library from Mercia Rotary on 5 August 2024. Once the legalities had been completed the change over was relatively calm, apart from the odd unwanted wasp!

The Parish Council would like to thank Mercia Rotary for administering the library for the past five years. If they had not undertaken running the library during this time, Eccleshall may well not have had a one now. Hopefully, the library will be a central hub in the town for many years to come.

Our library is a wonderful asset for our community and can offer so much more than you might believe. Apart from the vast choice of books for all ages, some in large print, audio books and a local studies reference section, there is also free wi-fi, free PC access, printing, photocopying and scanning for a small charge and information about local events. You can even ask for a tea/coffee and biscuit at a small cost. Across the week the library offers Baby Bounce and Rhyme, a Free IT clinic, and the Community Lounge. There are monthly sessions of the Reading Group and the Community Interest Talks for all to enjoy. Several current users of the upstairs Meeting Room will welcome new members to their activities and this room is available for hire for some sessions every month. Please ask at library reception for details of all these services and sessions.

Eccleshall Library's greatest asset is the thirty-one strong team of volunteers. Without these fantastic people the library could not function. You will always get a smile and welcome from the volunteers on duty. Many of these volunteers not only undertake regular reception duties but also carry out other functions i.e. checks for health & safety, fire and burglar alarms, water supply safety, production of the monthly duty rota, the book stock team, dressing the window and other library areas, overseeing Duke of Edinburgh participants, meeting room bookings, checking footfall numbers, provision of basic supplies, just to name but a few of the important regular jobs that are required.

The building will still be maintained by the County Council and the everyday running will be administered by the Library Management Team that is made of three library volunteers, two Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk and the County Council Library Community Support Officer.

We very much hope that you will pop in and find out more about what Eccleshall Library can offer.

### Allotment or Bog Garden? (A Personal View by Andy Iliffe, Eccleshall Allotments)

Has this year on the Eccleshall allotments been a once in a generation experience or is this what global warming is going to send us every year from now on?

As the pleasantly warm spring weather failed to arrive and the rain kept falling the usual hope and optimism for a bumper year began to fade. The normal wheelbarrows full of courgettes started to look like a distant memory and I began wondering what we still had in the freezers.

In April and May, we should have been busily planting seeds and seedlings, not feeding the ducks. Don't laugh, I did type "how to grow rice" into google. And if we did have the impudence to put any plants out natures Death Squad soon put us in our place. I checked my bible. Slugs are not between boils and locusts as one of the Plagues of Egypt.



As secretary of the Eccleshall Allotments Association it is my role to show prospective new plot holders around the site. I really enjoy showing people around but it's difficult to sell a plot when it's underwater.

But the year hasn't been a complete disaster. Summer did arrive for a couple of

months, and we were reminded how rapidly plants can grow when the mercury rises. The third or fourth attempt to grow runner beans showed promise and they began to climb the canes quicker than the slugs could strip them. I lost count of how many times we planted carrots but suddenly they poked their fingers out of the soil, took their chance and gave us a bumper crop.





I thought the cucumber plants were gone but like Lazarus of Bethany they rose from the dead. (Sorry, that's two biblical references). It's also been a good year for pumpkins. We won't have to cancel Halloween. We managed to get one of our barbecues in during the summer at which we celebrated the life of our past chairman Ron Milne with the unveiling of a bench.





# **Beech Road Play Area**

The Parish Council is pleased to announce that it has appointed Kompan as its preferred play supplier for the planned refurbishment of Beech Road play area into an inclusive space for all members of the community to enjoy.

The next stage of the process involves reviewing the design to ensure it is completely fit for purpose, and inviting members of the community to come and share their views on the proposed design at a further consultation stage before it is finalised and moves into the scheduling and build stages of the project.



Delivery of the play area is linked with the receipt of s.106 funding from Stafford Borough Council and the leasing of the play area to the Parish Council. As this needs to be factored into the timeline, we have a current expected completion date of Summer 2025. We look forward to sharing the final design and progress on our social media and website pages.

### Do You Need Transport Getting To Medical Appointments?

The Eccleshall Voluntary Car Scheme aims to provide transport for people in Eccleshall who have limited or no access to public transport or a private car.

Journeys to doctor's surgeries, Stafford or Stoke hospitals or other medical appointments are undertaken. To qualify for the scheme passengers must register, but there is no charge for registration.

Each journey will be much less than a conventional taxi, the drivers use their own vehicles and are volunteers who receive a nominal amount to cover petrol.

The Scheme also needs more volunteer drivers—can you spare some time to help?
