All of these activities, and those planned for the rest of this financial year, have been delivered with only a small change to the precept for 2025-2026, which currently sits at approximately £3.II per month for a Band D household.

Beech Road Community Park Refurbishment

The progress of the project by Eccleshall Parish Council to refurbish the outdated park at Beech Road has been eagerly watched by local residents over the last few weeks. The project includes the installation of a range of inclusive play equipment aimed at ages 0-12. The park will be open on completion of the safety inspection, with a formal opening ceremony planned for a

later date.

Funding streams include the allocation of £90,277.34 from Stafford Borough Council through developer section 106 contributions, towards a total cost of approximately £95,000. The



refurbishment is part of a long-term vision by the Parish Council, which has secured a 30-year lease to manage and maintain the site. The revamped park offers a welcoming and accessible space for all children, supporting physical activity, imaginative play and community engagement.

A second phase will follow in the autumn, creating sensory planted areas to further enhance the space. The initiative aims to enhance community well-being, promote inclusivity, and create a vibrant, shared outdoor space for all to enjoy.

to 9.45pm for a night of nostalgia, community spirit, and



Severn Trent launch scheme to upgrade customer-owned lead water pipes

We don't often think about the pipe that brings us fresh water every day. This supply pipe, particularly in properties built before 1970, could be made from lead, and is at higher risk of leaking, due to its age.

Replacing a supply pipe is the responsibility of the property owner, and can be quite costly to replace, but Severn Trent has launched a scheme for customers in the local area to replace lead pipes – **for free.**

Katie Machale, who manages the Supply Pipe Replacement project says, "Replacing a leaking supply pipe could cost up to £3,000 per property, however we are providing customers with brand new connections at no cost to them. This is all part of our investment into our network, to help make lead pipes a thing of the past for Eccleshall and the surrounding area."

Severn Trent aim to remove all lead supply pipes in the area, so will be contacting residents and business owners over the coming months. If you'd like to learn more, visit stwater.co.uk/supply-business-staffs

Croxton Well Dressing 2025

14th June 2025 saw the seventh Croxton Well Dressing Festival take place, - bringing together many people in the community of all ages as well as welcoming many visitors to the village. For over 12 months, people from a wide range of local community groups have been planning the event, creating the designs and collecting natural materials.

The theme for the 2025 Well Dressing Festival was linked to the 80th anniversary of V.E. Day. There were four decorated wells; - the largest one at Boughey's Well, on the main road through Croxton was entitled 'Forward Together' and was based on Winston Churchill and his contribution to achieving peace during WWII. Other designs had local connections – the 'Swynnerton Roses' well dressing commemorated the thousands of women who worked at the nearby Swynnerton Munitions factory. Another design celebrated 'The Women's Land Army', - many of whom worked on local farms whilst male farm workers had been called up to serve in the wartime forces. The smallest well dressing depicted Pablo Picasso's 'Dove of Peace'.

At 11.30am, Borough Councillors Jeremy Pert and Peter Jones together with hundreds of visitors gathered in front of Boughey's Well as Mrs Ruth Butter officially opened the Festival, and Mr Phil Finch (Safety & Training Officer at Swynnerton Army Camp) spoke about the important and dangerous work carried out by the brave women who worked at the Munitions factory in WWII.

As per tradition, water was celebrated with a 'blessing of the well' conducted by Rev. Dawn Walker and Rev. Sara Humphries. Right on cue, a brief shower of rain fell bringing a smile to everyone. As well as the trail through the village to see the 4 well dressings, people were also able to visit stalls and displays in the Millennium Wood and enjoy a bacon butty from the BBQ.

Tea and cake were available in St Paul's Church, Croxton, and at 2pm, a music and poetry concert took place showcasing the talents of local musicians. One of the pieces of poetry was especially written by Shan Jones for the event.



From Deluge to Drought (Allotmenteering ~ A Personal View)

It's the beginning of May 2025, and what a difference a year makes! This time last year, the allotments were impersonating swamps - cold, flooded, and generally uninviting. Seeds refused to germinate, and the slugs? Well, they were thriving, dining on the few brave plants that dared poke their heads above the surface. Fast forward to this year, and suddenly we're being warned about droughts and hosepipe bans. In fact, April was apparently the sunniest since dinosaurs were seen roaming on Elford Heath (well, maybe only since records began, but who

cares!)

I love introducing newcomers to the allotments and to the gardeners who are already members. Many arrive wide-eved with enthusiasm and some slightly terrified by the commitment. Many of the existing plot holders are very experienced and knowledgeable, and some might even appear to live on their allotment (they're always there). Some may seem a little shy (but not most) and if you're brave enough to ask most will enthusiastically dole out advice. My recommendation? Absorb all their wisdom, nod thoughtfully, and then do whatever feels right for you.





Because ask five different gardeners and you'll get five different answers, sometimes all contradictory.

That said, there is one golden rule I always stand by and that's patience. No matter how eager you are to stick your seedlings in the ground, February and March are generally a bad idea. The soil is still chilly,

frost can lurk well into May, and your ambitious efforts could end in shrivelled stumps.

Moving on - it's now the end of May, and we've finally had some rain! A relief for farmers, allotmenteers, and unfortunately, weeds. But despite the much-needed showers, we're still finding reasons to grumble. (It's tradition.) Personally, I'm fretting about being behind—Ray's potatoes are already well ahead of mine, Malcolm's courgettes look ready to stage a coup, and Michelle's peas have left mine looking like underachievers. However, I'm claiming small victories: lettuce is now on the menu, I pulled my first onion yesterday (a long-time resident from last year), and strawberries are starting to appear. Radishes are abundant, but that's only exciting if you actually enjoy radishes.

Jealousy though, I've decided, is wasted energy. Instead, I've opted for the tried-and-tested method of lurking discreetly and spying on the experts before copying what they do. I know that may contradict what I just said, but that's gardening for you.

So, if the weather behaves itself, this could be a good



year—at the very least, hopefully, not as mindbogglingly dispiriting as last year. And few things are more satisfying than hosting a dinner party and watching your guests marvel as you smugly inform them that every last bite is homegrown.

Encouraging Butterflies to Boost Local Biodiversity in Eccleshall

Eccleshall Parish Council is committed to enhancing the natural environment for the benefit of both local wildlife and residents. One key initiative we would like to promote is the encouragement of butterflies into our gardens, green spaces, and wider countryside.

Butterflies are not only beautiful to watch, but they also play an essential role in maintaining a healthy and balanced ecosystem. By increasing butterfly populations, we can significantly improve biodiversity in our local area.

Butterflies are excellent indicators of a healthy environment. Their presence often reflects a well-functioning ecosystem, rich in a variety of plants and insects. They are also important pollinators, helping to fertilise wildflowers and garden plants, which supports food chains for other species, including birds and small mammals. When butterflies thrive, so too do bees, moths,

and other invertebrates, all of which are vital to a vibrant and sustainable ecosystem.

Unfortunately, butterfly numbers across the UK have been in decline due to habitat loss, pollution, and climate change.

Eccleshall Parish Council recognises the need to reverse this trend at the local level. By encouraging residents and community groups to plant butterfly-friendly gardens and protect existing habitats, we aim to create a network of green corridors where butterflies can feed, breed, and flourish.

Simple actions such as planting nectar-rich flowers, reducing pesticide use, and leaving areas of lawn to grow wild can make a significant difference. Creating spaces with native wildflowers supports not only butterflies but many other species. Hedgerows, meadows, and woodland edges also offer critical shelter and breeding grounds.

Eccleshall Parish Council would like this initiative to become part of a broader biodiversity strategy to enhance the resilience of our local environment. A healthy butterfly population is not an end goal, but a sign of a thriving landscape where many forms of life are interconnected and supported. It also offers social and educational benefits – engaging children, inspiring gardeners,

and promoting community involvement in conservation

efforts.
